FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Tigers,

It has been an interesting start to the school year with remote learning being the platform from day one. I speak for all of us when I say, I miss the kids! I have personally visited dozens of virtual classrooms and have been impressed with the work from staff and students. They have been making learning fun, creative, and engaging under a difficult situation. I hope you can agree that remote learning has been mostly positive for everyone involved.

Believe it or not, we are about halfway through the first quarter. As a parent myself, checking Home Access Center (HAC) is an important part of monitoring your student's progress in school, especially during remote learning. We encourage students to reach out to their teachers if they have concerns with a grade, how they performed on an assignment/ assessment, or if they are struggling with the instructional platform. Every teacher wants their students to be successful and are willing to help. Do not wait. Address a concern now before it becomes a problem down the road.

Teachers will be emailing parents and students if they are receiving a D or F at the six-week grade mark. Parents can expect notification during the week of October 5th. Emails will be sent to the parent's email on file and the student's psd202.org email account.

Although we do not know when we will return to in-person instruction, I know students have their views on remote learning after speaking with several of them. Some students are struggling without being in the building to socialize with friends, participating in the activities they love, and supporting Tiger Nation at extracurricular events. Others are enjoying the later start time, having independence in their learning, all while being provided the opportunity to see their teachers and friends online for class.

For me, I look forward to the day when kids start walking through the door to experience high school with everything it has to offer. Until then, stay positive and take one day at a time. Remember these few strategies to allow for the most success while remote learning:

- -Be consistent with routines and workspace
- -Turn your camera on during class and actively participate
- -Submit quality work by the assigned due dates
- -Monitor grades in HAC
- -Communicate with teachers when needed

CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Normally this is the time of year when information relating to standardized testing for all grade levels is usually posted in this newsletter. However, due to our current situation there are many things that are still being discussed and adapted at this time. We are asking that you make sure you and your student read all email correspondence that is being sent from either the District Office or Plainfield North High School to make sure you have the most up-to-date information. Here is what we can share as of today regarding testing at Plainfield North High School. All seniors were notified at the end of September as to what date they were assigned for the SAT. The fall SAT testing dates are for seniors only, as the State of Illinois requires an inschool SAT test for graduation. The senior students who replied to the survey by September 9th that they wanted to test in October were notified of their assigned date at the end of September. They will continue to receive updates up to the night before their test date. All other senior students will be assigned the testing date in April.

Advanced Placement exam registration forms and information were sent out on September 25th and will need to be completed online. The AP registration due date is no later than October 21st. The online payment window will begin on October 26th and close on November 6th. Students were assigned a code from their Advanced Placement teacher to gain access to the AP classroom online, which every student needs to access to utilize the online resources and register for the exam. If you have any questions, please contact your student's Advanced Placement teacher.

Freshman, sophomore, and junior testing information is still being discussed and planned, and information will be sent out when available.

All other grade level standardized testing for this school year is still being discussed at this time. We will send information out to the appropriate grade levels once it becomes available. Thank you for your patience and understanding during these unique times.

SCIENCE & MATH

Teachers are working hard in the math and science division to provide engaging lessons to their students. Thank you to the parents that are supporting our efforts and encouraging their students to participate! Remember teachers are still available to help students during their office hours. Look for tutoring venues to open soon! MTV (Math Tutoring Venue) is going virtual.

Science:

It is great to see students taking an interest in science. The pictures below were shared in Mr. Patel's physics class.



The above picture is of Jupiter. These photos were taken on Mr. Patel's phone, so the light interferes with the camera. Looking through the telescope with the naked eye, you could actually see the cloud formations on Jupiter.








Two of the above pictures are of Saturn and the comet that passed by in July/August. The comet has an orbit that is around 6,700 years. Also, above is a picture of the moon.

Lori Kraus's students shared videos. They were short, about 30 seconds, to show movement based on a graph. This was also a way for Ms. Kraus to connect with her students via remote learning.

The chemistry classes are using pHet simulations to help them understand the model of the atom and the placement of protons, neutrons and electrons within the atom. pHet simulations help us model science concepts by giving us a visual to help explain ideas that are unable to be seen by the human eye, like the atom.





Ms. Kieft's forensics classes are doing an at home lab where they are testing Locard's Exchange Principal to see if they can find trace evidence on their clothes from everywhere and everyone they came in contact with during the day.

Biology classes are starting strong by looking at biological structures from the cell to an organism. Many classes have implemented virtual labs for their students, giving them another explanation of curricular topics.

Math:

In Algebra 2 Honors, Mrs. Vetrovec's students all got a different system of three equation problems. They recorded a video of themselves explaining their thought process, steps, and work. It was a different way to assess them and gave them a chance to practice explaining their work and use math vocabulary.

Geometry and Honors Geometry students are currently working on the curriculum in unit one: Proof, parallel and perpendicular lines. Teachers have been utilizing google classroom, Springboard curriculum and supplementing our workbook with DeltaMath (an online math support website for students to engage in video lessons, extra problems, and assessments). Students have been interacting with breakout rooms during our live zoom sessions, sharing google slides, and are successfully navigating online strategies.

ENGLISH & SOCIAL STUDIES

English and Social Studies teachers have been tirelessly working on preparing engaging humanities lessons for our Northside students. Our division thanks you for your continued support and patience as we navigate and grow accustomed to this new learning environment.

English:

Many English teachers are working on building those early skills needed for the rest of the English curriculum. Great examples this week include: Mrs. Goska providing lessons on tone in works of literature and reading, Mr. Smith and Ms. Beaupre exercise identification of pronouns and themes in short stories.

Social Studies:

Social Studies teachers continue to work on providing students with the skills needed to interpret and understand primary source documents. Examples include: World History teachers Ms. Hoch, Ms. Mays, and Mrs. Gummerson guiding students through the basic tenants of the various world religions. Mr. Paymaster has been doing an excellent job incorporating current events at the beginning of his US History courses to engage students in historical thought and social science critical thinking.

WORLD LANGUAGES/FINE ARTS/ CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION

World Language:

The World Language department is excited to welcome two new staff members to PNHS. Tammie Terry is our new American Sign Language instructor. She comes with years of experience from the Joliet district. Maureen Holt will be teaching french at both North and East. We are looking forward to having them join the WL team.

German 1 is diving in to our "Who are you?" unit, where they will learn about professions and leisure time activities. This will conclude with a project where students create a presentation about who they are, with a baby picture attached. The class will then walk around the room, reading each poster and try to guess who each student is, based on the baby picture and surrounding information. Students are already conducting full conversations with their friends about who they are and are looking forward to expanding these discussions to include the new material.

German 2 has been doing a lot of work with the past tense. Students have gotten the opportunity to talk about their summers and during the month of October will get to write a letter to their future selves. Students will write letters about their freshman year to be opened during their senior year. My seniors always love coming in and asking for their letters at the end of their time here at North.

German 3 will be reading a German version of "If You Give a Mouse a Cookie" and then will write their own book using the newly learned tense. Students will write, illustrate, and present their books to the class. Students will also be researching study abroad opportunities and exploring the differences between German study abroad and those offered here in the United States.

German AP will be completing their immigration unit with a project about German-American's. Did you know that Milton Hershey came here from Germany? Through this project, students will explore the hardships of moving to a new country, as well as the influences that these immigrants had on our country. Then they will be moving on to our globalization unit, where they will be discussing the upcoming German elections as well as other global topics such as the environment. October 1st-7th is also National German-American week and AP will have a huge part in helping us celebrate this at PNHS.

Career and Technical Education:

The CTE department is pleased to welcome two new staff members to PNHS. Daniel Redmore will be teaching business classes and Autumn Tsang is joining the FACS area by teaching culinary arts courses. We are excited to have them joining the CTE team this year!

PHYSICAL EDUCATION/DRIVERS EDUCATION/HEALTH CLASSES

Students Currently In Driver Education Class:

Students in Driver Education are currently getting some behind-the-wheel (BTW) time for their required lessons before and after school. Students must have their permit first before signing up. Students need to complete 12 lessons with an instructor and 50 hours of practice time with a parent/guardian to complete the behind-the-wheel (BTW) phase of obtaining a drivers license.
